Cohousing Update:

We have been working very hard since the summer, expanding our efforts to secure a Community Asset Transfer (CAT) from the council, reaching out to sources of support, and making friends with other cohousing groups.



On11th October we had an on site visit to the vacant Campsie View School site with: Left to Right; David Carracher, Estates Dept., East Dunbartonshire Council; Murdoch Wilson, LCDT; Margaret Whitelaw, LCDT; Margaret Reid, LCDT; Margaret O'Connor, Community Enterprise Scotland; Matt Bridgestock, Architect and Director, John Gilbert Architects.



We have met twice with our local councillors, Provost Renwick and Willie Paterson to keep them up to date with our progress. We are still talking to Estates Department about their offer to present our submission at the full council meeting alongside their own. We understand that will take place in February, 2024 On

15th December we have a meeting with the head of EDC's Health and Social Care Partnership. They granted us £1000 which we used to host 2 public events.

We have received funding from CEIS and our Adviser Margaret O'Connor (see picture above) has written a 20 page expert report

to present to the council as part of our feasibility study and business plan for 22 community-led retirement homes on the site.



Matt Bridgestock (see photo), from John Gilbert Architects had drawn up two preliminary sketches of layouts for the site; one retaining the existing building

and retrofitting homes, the other for new build. We will discuss these with the 30 people who have indicated a continuing interest in the homes.

Following our Public meeting they ran our event at the Community Festival, "Imagine If: Housing could be more than just Houses? The brought their Imaginarium game and found that in Lenzie the resulting data set showed the diversity of needs from housing and the context it sits in, ie guest room

or shared laundry could be integrated within a housing development rather than each residential unit having a private dedicated space for this. We will invite them back to run a follow up event with those who expressed a continuing interest.





If funding can be obtained, CaCHE is interested in conducting research into Lenzie Cohousing from start to finish which would make it unique.
